ChildPact Regional Mapping Survey on INSPIRE Strategies to End Violence Against Children




INTRODUCTION

This report is largely based on the inputs and observations of 296 organisations and institutions working in child protection in Albania, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Kosovo, Republic of Moldova, Serbia and Turkey.

The objective of the <u>Mapping Survey</u> on INSPIRE is to better understand the current efforts and improve synergies between existing actors working on the implementation of INSPIRE strategies in our region. Data collected via this survey has been analysed and used as a basis for country factsheets that will inform stakeholders and donors involved in INSPIRE related activity across the region.

As the survey was shared through child protection national coalitions, most of the respondents are coalition members, yet only a relatively small minority of them state that they are part of a national level INSPIRE working group.

The organisations working in the region that took part to the survey conduct activities that directly relate to one or more of the INSPIRE strategies, even though not all of them are part of national level working groups.



CROSS - CUTTING ASPECTS

The section below point at cross-cutting aspects that are relevant for all INSPIRE strategies. Examples of activities relevant to the different strategies will be outlined separately in the following section.

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE NGO SECTOR AND STATE AUTHORITIES

Most NGOs participating in the INSPIRE Regional Mapping Survey have implemented some INSPIRE related projects and activities with external funding and very few have received public funding (4 in Bulgaria, 7 in Georgia, 9 in Serbia)

Few organizations indicated they however received some form of assistance from the state in terms of partnerships or consisting mostly in in kind contributions (specifically excluding financial support).

Most of the organisations active in the field finance their activities entirely through projects. However, taking into consideration the need to improve services, the current support is not enough and does not ensure sustainable and quality service provisions. Many organisations operating in the region claim that the state support must be regular, structured and consistent in order to strengthen the civil society sector interventions in frame with INSPIRE Strategies.

ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED BY ORGANISATIONS WHO ARE PART OF A NATIONAL LEVEL INSPIRE WORKING GROUP

The INSPIRE Strategies are still rather unknown in the region and the Mapping Survey proved to be the perfect opportunity for national coalitions working in child protection to reach out to their members and disseminate knowledge about INSPIRE using the survey as a tool also for promotion.

There are no working groups on INSPIRE in Albania, Kosovo and Serbia.

In **Armenia** there is an active national level working group including 21 organizations members of the national coalition. There currently is under implementation a five year public campaign called "Share Love, Not Violence" aimed at combating violence against children and gathering a wide range of stakeholders collaborating for its implementation.

In **Azerbaijan** the current national working group is comprised of five organizations, including Reliable Future NGO, Azerbaijan Child Helpline, Public Health and Reforms Center. More activities to promote and raise awareness about INSPIRE are needed and the national coalition will work in the attempt to get more NGOs get involved.

In **Bosnia and Herzegovina** the Network Stronger Voice for Children will lead a national level INSPIRE working group this year and it has expressed its interest for wide open partnerships in promoting and advocating for the implementation of INSPIRE strategies.

In **Bulgaria** there is no national level INSPIRE group. Within the National Council for Child Protection chaired by the State Agency for Child Protection and comprising of representatives of all relevant governmental structures and some NGOs, there is a Working Group on "Prevention of violence and abuse against children". The members of the working group monitor the implementation of the National Programme for the Prevention of Violence and Abuse against Children (2017 - 2020) and the Action Plan for its implementation. The National Network for Children in Bulgaria and several other organisations are members of this working group.

Respondents to the survey have stated they are a part of a national level group that has activities related to INSPIRE, citing the work of the Applied Research and Communications Fund with different ministries in prevention of sexual exploitation and media and internet literacy. The other two organisations (P.U.L.S. Foundation and Social Activities and Practices Institute) explained that as a part of the Childhood Without Violence Alliance (an informal alliance, comprised of 17 NGOs and 2 experts) they have dedicated work on the promotion of the INSPIRE technical package.

In **Georgia**, 8 out of 41 organisations that participated in the survey are part of INSPIRE working group (SOS Children's Villages Georgia, GCRT, Anti-Violence Network of Georgia, Save the Children, Mac Georgia, Partnership for Human Rights, Initiative for Social Changes, Georgian Association of Social Workers.) The group is functioning under organisations Initiative for Social Changes, with financial support from the INSPIRE Fund. The group unites CSOs and governmental representatives to choose country relevant programs from INSPIRE and create an advocacy strategy that will be taken forward by the National Coalition for Children and Youth, the ChildPact member in Georgia.


In **Moldova** there is a working group but only few organisations members of the national coalition APSCF are part of it at the moment.

PREVENTION OF SEXUAL ABUSE AND EXPLOITATION

Organisations active on the prevention of child sexual abuse and exploitation that participated to the Mapping Survey provide a wide variety of activities and services focusing mainly on prevention services, including awareness-raising campaigns and trainings.

The second type of activities carried out by the responding organizations is related to lobbying and advocacy for improving the legal framework, social policies and the aspects of victim's rehabilitation and protection.

The third type of activity relates to the provision of direct assistance through shelters, housing and rehabilitation programmes.



Examples of practices from the region

In **Kosovo**¹ the Coalition of NGOs for Child Protection KOMF has implemented the Child Protection Index (CPI)². CPI is an independent instrument created jointly by ChildPact and World Vision that measures a country's child protection system against a common set of indicators. CPI is implemented every two years and is a national monitoring tool which measures government efforts to protect children from all forms of abuse, violence, neglect, exploitation and trafficking. Through this tool, Coalition of NGOs for Child Protection KOMF has been advocating for a set of provisions regarding the sexual exploitation of children as follows:

• The cases of sexual abuse against children must be treated and proceeded with maximal priority and emergency from the Police, Prosecution and Court.

- A free, national level hotline designed with and for children should be established. The service should take calls and
 provide support, counselling and networking for children in situations of violence, abuse, neglect, drug abuse,
 abduction, trafficking and other forms of exploitation.
- Raise awareness of children in schools on the forms of abuse, as well as reporting of such cases in the school or other relevant institutions.
- Kosovo should increase venues that allow for self-reporting and peer-reporting in situations of sexual exploitation and abuse

In **Azerbaijan** few organizations participating to the INSPIRE mapping survey indicated they have a focus on prevention of child abuse and exploitation. Most of them mentioned social issues and awareness raising. However, a number of projects supported by Youth Foundation and NGO Support Council address this specific topic. Four NGOs have been working with Ministry of Education in schools to conduct activities related to prevention of child abuse and exploitation.

Seven other organizations in Azerbaijan are members of the Coalition to fight trafficking in humans and have been active in the field of prevention of trafficking in children as well as providing support to children-victims of trafficking and children who are at high risk to become victims of trafficking.

The coalition is in close partnership with Ministry of Internal Affairs and supports the implementation of a national anti-trafficking strategy.

Three organizations work closely with police departments and penitentiary services to prevent violence against children in detention centers and in police custody as well as promote alternatives to imprisonment.

In **Bosnia and Herzegovina** NGOs remain the only providers of SOS hotline line services for children victims. The Network Stronger Voice for Children has been advocating for the creation of a an easily recognizable telephone line at the state level and pressured the government to take responsibility for ensuring increasing access to the child abuse reporting hotline services currently provided by NGOs. ³

The network members are also advocating for urgent changes to the Federation Criminal code and specific provisions regarding processing of perpetrators of sexual offense against children, in partnership with other NGOs from Bosnia and Herzegovina and with the support of the Ombudsman for Human Rights. Other important activities are related to advocating for consistent application of Lanzarote Convention in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

In **Bulgaria**, "For our Children" Foundation has highlighted as a success story their work on developing a methodology with "Guidelines for a Secure Family Environment", in collaboration with children, families and experts, which can guide all professionals working with families to prevent and address violence against children.⁴

The Crime Prevention Fund IGA has cited their work in developing Circles of Support and Accountability – a unique and innovative community justice initiative for post release support and monitoring of medium- and high-risk sex offenders in and by the community.⁵

Two organisations – Social Activities and Practices Institute ⁶ and "Association Animus" Foundation ⁷ have cited their work on developing "Zona ZaKrila" services – child and youth advocacy centre developed in the basis of the Barnahus model.

The Applied Research and Communications Fund⁸ has highlighted their educational programme "Cyberscouts" as a very effective and promising practice. Running already since five years, the programme has trained hundreds of children from all over the country to recognise online hazards, prevent and respond to and disseminate their knowledge and advise their peers.

Learn Foundation has picked their "Better don't" campaign which included a series of educational videos on their online sexual education platform Loveguide.bg and a booklet on how to protect yourself from sexual violence and sexual exploitation. 9

In **Moldova**, Child Rights Information Center (CRIC) provide trainings for teacher on applying two interactive programs: "Dragos' Challenges" (for 7-11 year olds) and "Grain of Sand" (for students aged 12 to 18). The programs aim to prevent any form of violence against the child, including abuse and sexual exploitation. Training for professionals from educational field, parents and children always includes the prevention of sexual abuse and sexual exploitation of children.

In 2018, CRIC consulted a group of children on how the Republic of Moldova fulfills its obligations under the ratification of the Lanzarote Convention, focusing on the online environment. A report was prepared and sent to the Committee of Lanzarote Parties to the Lanzarote Convention. Also CRIC has provided consultancy in monitoring the work of the local structures of the National Council for the Protection of Children's Rights (Level II); the elaboration and promotion of the Action Plan on online child safety; participation in the work of the Supervisory Committee of the Council of Europe project "Protecting children from sexual exploitation and sexual abuse in the Republic of Moldova".

In **Armenia** a number of 23 organizations taking part in our survey responded that they are implementing preventive actions dedicated to the child sexual abuse. Activities range from advocacy towards enactment of referral mechanisms for all kind of violence against children to capacity development of local specialists on early identification and timely response to the cases of sexual abuse and exploitation. Educational manuals and guidelines for the child protection specialists on adequate response and prevention of child sexual abuse and exploitation are also being developed and availability of temporary shelter is provided. Direct responses to cases of violence are provided by trained professionals and advocacy actions are targeting the increase of sensitivity towards the issue.





INSPIRE STRATEGIES

STRATEGY 1: IMPLEMENTATION AND ENFORCEMENTS OF LAWS







Examples of practices from the region

In **Moldova** the International Center "La Strada" has elaborated the report on "The status quo of the implementation of the Lanzarote Convention by the Republic of Moldova". The findings of the report served as a basis for the proposals formulated in drafting the National Action Plan on Human Rights 2017-2021 and support for discussions within the National Dialogue on Violence against Children organized by UNICEF Moldova in June 2018;

NCCAP organization has been working on the promotion of special hearing of child victims/witnesses of crimes, including through the creation of Integrated Childcare Assistance services, such as the Barnahus.

In **Azerbaijan** the adoption of the Law on Domestic Violence and State Programs on Prevention of Domestic Violence has improved the awareness in the field and also speed up the process of putting in place protection mechanisms for cases of violence against children and women. The law and state program also enabled for State Committee for family, women and children's problems to establish the database of violence cases.

NGOs have been lobbying the government along with Ombudsman and UNICEF to achieve the adoption of Law on corporal punishment. NGOs have also been promoting the development of new Child Code that needs to substitute the old 1998 law on child rights and include more provisions and today's concerns.

In **Bosnia and Herzegovina** the Network Stronger Voice for Children in partnership with World Vision BiH have been working to develop the Child Protection Index¹⁰, a monitoring tool to analyse government performance towards achieving commitments undertaken by signing the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Viewed through an impressive number of indicators (987), the Index provides an insight into the progress made in critical areas including the protection of children from all forms of violence. The report¹¹ issued in April 2019 includes specific recommendations on government needed actions to reinforce policies and laws, such as:

- The adoption of laws preventing persons convicted of violence or acts of sexual abuse of children to work with children or have access to children.
- A register of sexual offenders against children exists only in the Republic of Srpska. Key recommendations adhering
 to the article 34 is to adapt laws and establish the same register for the territory of the Federation of BiH and Brčko
 District.
- Urgent ratification of the Hague Convention on the Protection of Children and Co-operation in the Field of Interstate Adoption is recommended, in addition to its full alignment with the procedures for adoption with Article 21 of the UNCRC.
- Advocating for rising the upper age limit for adoption and ensure coherence between entities is also needed.
 Introduction of a legal provision for the explicit ban on placing children up to three years of age in institutions, as well as the explicit ban on corporal punishment of children in all settings is strongly recommended.

In **Serbia** SIPRU has been working actively on the Strategy for Preventing and Protection of Children against Violence and the Action Plan for the Strategy. They are also active members of the Children's Rights Council in Serbia and National Coalition for Ending Child Marriages.

SOS Children's Villages Serbia is advocating for banning violent punishment of children in all area of life, and advocate for changes to the Social Protection law in order to have better and quality services for children and families.

In **Armenia** the government, in consultations with CSOs, has developed a Master Action Plan that ensures a holistic approach for child protection reforms and serves as platform to coordinate all the contributions from the partners.



STRATEGY 2: NORMS AND VALUES (GENDER, SOCIAL, COMMUNITY)

Examples of practices from the region

In **Albania** the initiative "Protect Children from Violence", implemented by Child Rights Centre of Albania (CRCA)/ECPAT Albania deals with norms and values in relation to protection of children and youth form violence, in cooperation with NGOs that also work for LGBTI adolescents.

The Roma Project implemented by Child Rights Centre of Albania (CRCA)/ECPAT Albania deals more specifically with Roma children integration in school and issues during their school attendance, such as discrimination, violence, etc.

In **Bulgaria** the National Network of Health Mediators has been organising discussions and meetings with people from vulnerable communities and support groups, run by health mediators.

Social Activities and Practices Association has been running training on positive disciplinary methods in the community as a part of the "Hands Up" project against corporal punishment.

In **Georgia** 28 organisations identified that they are doing different activities linked to the Norms and Values. Most of them identified three main topics:

- Changing adherence to restrictive and harmful gender norms;
- Changing adherence to restrictive and harmful social norms;
- Community mobilization programmes.


Hera XXI organisation has its own copyright transfer which aims to raise up important social topics and professionally broadcast topics of sexual and reproduction health¹².


In **Moldova** the Gender Equality Platform conducts information and awareness rising activities on the roles of gender stereotypes in girls' and boys' lives, and how they affect decisions made by girls and boys based on gender stereotypes. These activities are developed in various ways: talk shows, public lessons, dialogue with students and young people and others.

In **Serbia** Zlatiborski Krug initiated the establishment of the Gender Equality Council in the municipality of Cajetina and regularly implements activities to raise awareness of the population about the importance of gender equality.

STRATEGY 3: SAFE ENVIRONMENTS







The Mapping Survey answers for this question show that there is no common understanding on what the INSPIRE Strategy on Safe environments mean. Analyzing the inputs received, it seems that most of the respondents do not necessarily recognize this strategy as a distinctive one from their work in relation to other strategies.

Examples of practices from the region

In **Azerbaijan** several NGOs, including Reliable Future, Child Helpline and National PTA as well as Child-to-Child Peace Network, work in schools to promote the establishment of safeguards for children to ensure their protection from violence.

In **Bulgaria**, Applied Research and Communications Fund conducts trainings of students, teachers and social workers on safe use of technologies.


In **Georgia**, Welfare and Development Center has a special questionnaire relevant for children under age 7 to identify safety issues at home and outside. Once the data is collected, they provide specific recommendations to the family how to transform space to be safer for the child.

Partnership for Human Rights has module for informational meetings at school, which includes theoretical presentation and practical exercises in order to raise awareness concerning the importance of identifying "hot spots" within schools.

In **Armenia** training on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) is provided by Save the Children Armenia and the World Vision Armenia in order to equip institutions working with children, including schools, with relevant knowledge and skills necessary to plan and implement DRR activities, including first medical assistance in schools.

STRATEGY 4: PARENT AND CARE GIVER SUPPORT





Examples of practices from the region

In **Bosnia and Herzegovina**, according to the survey results, activities aimed for parents and care givers are mainly conducted through group work in communities or through comprehensive programs. Home visits are delivered by Centers for Social Work but also by World Vision BH which work in cooperation with religious institutions and representatives.

The Center for Social Work of Sarajevo Canton cooperate a lot with governmental and NGO sector in realization of such programs of education of parents and caregivers, offering them the support needed. These programs are especially valuable in rural areas. One example of such project can be seen at this link. The initiative includes work with parents of children at risk and trainings on positive parenting.

In **Bulgaria** the Association Animus Foundation runs the "Mother and Baby" Unit / MBU/ social service - a 24-hour community service which is often defined by administrative institutions as a type of residential care community service. The main target group consists of mothers victims of gender-based violence regardless of ethnicity, religious beliefs or sexual orientation.

The "Being a Dad" Campaign¹³ indicated by the respondents to our survey is a national campaign aiming at focusing the public's attention on the importance of the father's role for the child's full development

In **Georgia** Hera XXI is administrating online web pages for teachers and parents, as well as mobile applications about sexual and reproduction health and have online consultation service (www.forteachers.ge, http://hera-youth.ge/livezilla/chat.php?a=49f87).

The Georgian Association of Social Workers developed several books and brochures to support the better knowledge of the care givers, parents regarding positive parenting.

Georgian Foster Care Organization has been piloting an innovative community support service in the frame of an EU funded project. The Parental Skills Training Service was initially started by the clergy and further developed together with the project team and has been providing parenting training to the members of the religious congregations. The main objective of the program is to minimize abuse of children in the families by training and empowering parents to establish positive communication with their children based on trust and understanding, thus preventing child abuse. The program should be extended to reduce wide-spread harsh parenting practices, promote non-violent discipline and effective parent-child communication. The church seems well positioned to advance the program due to its high public trust.

In **Moldova** CCF Moldova performs regular monitoring of deinstitutionalized children through regular visits at home. They also provide methodological support for schools and kindergartens. The organization helps families to accessing social, educational and medical services and benefits, legal, medical and psychological counselling and the formation of the family support network in the community. Providing counselling to develop parental skills by developing an individual support is also an important component of their activity.



STRATEGY 5: INCOME AND ECONOMIC STRENGTHENING



Activities that relate to Strategy 5: Income and economic strengthening Number of organisations and institutions that conduct given type of activities (by country)



Strategy 5 is the least represented INSPIRE strategy according to our survey analysis. The respondents to the survey indicated however a series of activities under this INSPIRE strategy:

- Microfinance combined with gender norm training
- Cash transfers
- Group saving and loans combined with gender norm trainings
- Small grants projects
- Paying for education/ scholarship
- Providing information about the importance of economic strengthening
- Income Generating Projects and Social Enterprises
- Employment of people with disabilities and development of social entrepreneurship
- Supporting the development of individual and group agricultural activities
- Promotion of self-employment

Examples of practices from the region

In **Albania** some of organizations such as CRCA/ECPAT, DEV-AID and Initiative for Social Change-ARSIS are supporting Roma mothers (especially single mothers) to get professional vocational trainings.

In **Azerbaijan**, Independent Life organization is involved in the organization of vocational training courses for children and youth with disabilities in partnership with Ministry of Social Protection and Labor.

In **Bulgaria** Women's Association Ekaterina Karavelova is gathering donations and distributes resources to vulnerable children and families.


The Bulgarian Family Planning and Sexual Health Association provides trainings to Roma families through the Network of Health Mediators.

In **Georgia** the Education Development and Employment Center (EDEC) works in the direction of vocational training for people with disabilities to support their employment. Job fairs are organized in order to create employment opportunities for the beneficiaries of day care centres as well as other disabled job seekers. The organization has established two social enterprises which aim to support the employment of vulnerable groups.

Livelihood support is provided by making available material means to families in Armenian communities, such as working tools, domestic animals, etc. that can enable them improve on the long term their livelihood situation. Provision of business grants and counselling on development and implementation of business plans is also provided by Fund for Armenian Relief and WVA aiming to strengthen the support for improved livelihoods.

STRATEGY 6: RESPONSE AND SUPPORT SERVICES





Examples of practices from the region


In Bosnia and Herzegovina there are therapeutic services provided by employees of the Center for Social Work, however, these services are provided only in exceptional situations when the person needs immediate support and cannot wait for this service in other institutions located in a different zone. This is one of the reasons why the NGO sector has been advocating for more support in order to be able to conduct and own more such facilities.

In **Moldova**, Sigur online service is the first online interactive information safety platform for children online, which, in addition to providing information and awareness-raising to children, parents and educators, has the option of chatting for real-time online counseling, but also incorporates a friendly reporting mechanism for online abuse cases.

In **Serbia** Open Club Niš implemented the "Employment Support Package" project to promote psychological counseling to strengthen self-confidence and increase employment motivation.

STRATEGY 7: EDUCATION AND LIFE SKILLS





Strategy 7 and its activities seems to be the most represented INSPIRE strategy among the organisations that participated to the survey.

Examples of practices from the region

In **Moldova** the "On the Way" program is a resilience development educational program for children (6 to 12 years old) based on a methodology provided by NCCAP in September 2016. The aim of the program is to develop behavioral habits to overcome potentially dangerous situations (which can happen at home, in the street, at school, in the park, etc.) and develop children's resilience. The target groups are: children (6-12 years), teachers of primary classes, support staff working with primary school pupils, psychologists, social workers from community centers for children, school psychologists, librarians;

In **Bulgaria** Key to a Fear-free School introduces teachers to implementing the teaching method proposed by the prevention programs in all classes between 1st and 10th grade in three schools in Bulgaria for five consecutive school years. Key to a Fear-free School is co-funded by OAK Foundation, Switzerland. It started in May 2016 and will last for 5 years until 2021 ("Association Animus" Foundation).

Loveguide¹⁴ is a health and sexual education platform, through which Learn Foundation develops online and offline training and provides information to teenagers in four main areas: changes in puberty, sex and safe sex, prevention of sexual violence, safe and responsible online behaviour. The information is entirely authoritative, reliable, hopeful and verified by specialists, written in a language that is understandable and interesting to students. The Foundation also does classroom classes at school, and we create content for Loveguide's online channels in social media such as YouTube, Facebook and Instagram.

CONCLUDING REMARKS

The mapping exercise conducted by ChildPact with the support of its member organizations in 11 countries in the extended Black Sea Region has been an excellent opportunity for reflection on the challenges posed by the attempt of linking a global package to concrete local situations in meaningful ways. These remarks are summarizing some eye-opening moments that we have been encountering throughout the data collection and data analysis stages of the mapping exercise. We want to share our thoughts and concerns with the hope that they can be helpful in future decisions and actions undertaken as part of the global efforts to use INSPIRE strategies to end violence against children.

- 1. Further promotion of INSPIRE framework is highly needed. Throughout the extended Black Sea Region the INSPIRE package is not very well known. Many organizations from the civil society sphere are working on dimensions that perfectly fit in the INSPIRE strategies without knowing that such a framework exists. Many advocacy efforts are not aligned with the INSPIRE framework thus missing the hugely relevant argument of their link with a globally accepted package of strategies. ChildPact places significant emphasis on the role of the national networks of NGOs as agents for promoting INSPIRE and the role of multi-stakeholder national level working groups as agents for implementing INSPIRE strategies.
- 2. Increased need for coordination is a crucial challenge in all the countries taking part in our mapping exercise. Looking through the practice examples form the region we could easily see that many of the efforts are duplicated, there are lots of entities (both NGOs and public institutions) working to develop and deliver a wide range of trainings for children, parents, social workers, foster parents etc. without any coordination. Efforts are significantly duplicated and so are resources. States display limited capacities to ensure national wide coordination, in some cases doubled by a limited transparency of their actions and limited willingness and openness to work together with civil society actors. International institutions are not always best positioned or best recognized either as structures that can foster coordination between state and civil society, adding yet another layer of duplication of actions and resources. ChildPact places significant emphasis on the need for international institutions in the region to work closely with the networks of local NGOs and facilitate their access to the decision making table where some governments are more keen to welcome the international actors rather than the national ones.
- 3. Institutionalized coordination mechanisms could be a solution to overcome gaps in communication, coordination and joint action. The situation is a little better in terms of communication and coordination in countries where national level working groups exist, although the level of operational effectiveness of the existing national working groups on INSPIRE varies widely across the region. ChildPact places significant emphasis on the role the existing networks of NGOs play in bringing together voices from the local level to the national decision making levels and ensuring a meaningful link between the international frameworks, the national decision making level, and the local level where problems exist and services are actually being provided to direct beneficiaries.

- 4. Adjustment of proposed strategies to specific conditions and acceptance and promotion of local good practice models could be a key factor in advancing the actual implementation of INSPIRE strategies at local level. Many times issues on the field are significantly shaped by the specific context, by the local environment, by existing vulnerabilities, habits or traditions that are sometimes strong enough to over-through a proven successful intervention model. Several times the success of the intervention is highly dependent on the particular skills, talents and approach of the person conducting an intervention or delivering a service. ChildPact places significant emphasis on the need for developing a collection of locally valid interventions that may be delivered under the INSPIRE strategies, with the support of the national level working groups and national networks of NGOs actually conducting interventions under each of the 7 strategies.
- 5. Existing regional bodies should be used order to advance the information and understanding of the INSPIRE package. It is clear that the communication efforts around the existence of the INSPIRE package need to be strengthened. Just as the 7 strategies are intended to work in combination and reinforce each other, the existing regional bodies are intended to foster collaboration and reinforce national and international efforts. Working on linking directly the global efforts with the national level, while skipping the existing regional level may limit the reach-out and the success of the intervention. Regional bodies exist because countries feel they have something in common and build on invisible bonds that make them come and work together. There is a certain level of energy and power that these regional bods can use to reinforce global efforts to reach the national level. ChildPact places significant emphasis on the role of regional bodies in promoting INSPIRE and improving coordination of implementation efforts by adequate consideration of the regional level in the allocation of resources and planning of the interventions.
